February Meeting

Monday, February 21st at 7p.m. at the JCC
Marine Mammal First Responder Workshop

At this month's meeting, the Marine Mammal & Sea Turtle Stranding Program at Mystic Aquarium & Institute for Exploration is holding a First Responder Workshop. This workshop is open to people interested in becoming first responders, and also anyone interested in the program and the state of marine mammals in our area.

Plan to arrive early, as this meeting is open to the public and expected to be well-attended.

About the Marine Mammal & Sea Turtle Stranding First Responder Program at Mystic Aquarium & Institute for Exploration:

First Responders are members of the general public who are willing to drive to respond to calls in their area. First responders never touch the animals and are trained through this course to visually identify common species and signs of physical and stress-related health issues. They then contact us and give us all the information they have so that we can decide the proper response. Since these responders are familiar with their coastline area, the idea is that they will be able to QUICKLY respond to calls about stranded marine animals and because of their training, accurately be able to gauge the health of the Marine Mammal or Sea Turtle they find.



While at the site, they can hand out our species identification brochures (which will be sent to them after training) and talk to the public about the species on our coastline and educate them about what they can do to help. The key to the first responders is their ability to cut our response time, allowing for a sick/injured seal to be brought in or a healthy seal to simply rest on the beach while the public is educated about why the seal is there.

The talk explains federal regulations, specifics about Mystic Aquarium & Institute for Exploration's Marine Mammal & Sea Turtle Stranding Program, the definition of a stranded animal, limitations of stranding programs, detailed descriptions of pinniped species and how to identify them, as well as signs of physical and stress-related health issues on pinnipeds. We also discuss safety and the duties of our First Responders.

First Responders must be 18 years old or more. However members of the public can attend the talk purely as an educational experience.

Starting the Year Right

When I pulled up to the breakfast restaurant across the street from the Branch River put-in and saw that it was actually open, even for the holiday, I knew it was going to be a good day. Erik was already there, sucking down some Joe. About five minutes later, our friend Tommy Taylor pulled in. We discussed options over omelets and pancakes, and decided on a shorter run that would allow us to enjoy the river and play around a bit, as opposed to bombing down the whole 7 miles before the rain started.

The sun that greeted us in the morning gave way to clouds as we unloaded boats and geared up, and Mike Bussell stopped by to wish us a happy new year, and to tell us that he hated us deep down, like true enemies, for daring to paddle his home river while he had to work. Nevertheless, he offered to shuttle us so we could leave all our vehicles at the take-out. Happy New Year, Mike! You Rule! We wish you had been there.

Just as we arrived back at the put-in for our "Day 1 of 2008" trip down the Branch River, the snow started to fall. We quickly got our gear together and launched below the dam, setting up to run the first rocky Class II below the bridge. Tommy showed the way, hitting the big eddy at the top, pivoting, and then driving for the right-side channel, bouncing down the waves to the pool beyond the bridge...all while standing up and poling! Erik (who just started poling this...uh, last...year) handled the first chute to the eddy, but then got swept backwards onto the shallow, bony left side, and had a bit of a rough go at it.

While he and his canoe were dancing with the rocks, I tried Tommy's route, and had a clean run...nice way to start

the year, because I've never tried that rapid standing before.

As we paddled past the old mill we were greeted by a couple up on the new riverwalk, watching us pole downstream. We exchanged holiday greetings, and they wished us a good trip. Conspicuously absent was any of the usual "do you guys know this river? Do you really think you should be standing? Don't you know it's too cold to canoe?" It was nice.

At the next small drop, Tommy and I played around, attaining the small broken dam a couple times and practicing eddy turns. Erik gave it the old college try, and almost made it up. His "stair-rail" pole did not have a sharp enough tip, though, and kept

slipping at critical moments. But...no step outs, and it was fun.

The snow was now coming down pretty good, leaving a hush over the woods. Chickadees and titmice chattered at us from the sidelines, probably offering us "advice" on how to canoe. We proceeded to basically ignore the Boy Scout rules of canoeing...we stood, jumped, drank beer (well, Erik behaved, I swear Michelle!), and generally laughed at the snowstorm. Trees arched gracefully over the river, every branch starkly outlined in white. The river's black, cold water contrasted sharply with the snowy banks, a dark highway down the valley of white and gray.

Whipple Drop, another rocky Class II broken dam, only had one really clean channel through it, and we all dropped down a few feet with style and grace, turning around and poling back up to ferry back and forth, playfully giving the noses of our canoes a little wash in the foam at the base of the drop. No compasses needed...the big rocks had a cover of snow that clung only to the north sides like cocked white caps on a bald rocky head.

Further downstream we had a treat...I noticed a small head, of what I took initially to be a muskrat (albeit a small one), swimming across the river, and pointed it out to the others. To my surprise, when it reached the bank, it leapt out and started hopping along the river past us, revealing itself to be a mink! With a tiny fish in its mouth! Very cool, especially with the snowy background. This was the first mink I have ever seen on this river. Of course, it dove down a hole before the cameras could come out.

Onward we poled, ducking under trees, floating past the snowy hills, chasing a few ducks ahead of us, and reveling in the beauty of the snowfall. It was like paddling in a giant Asteroid video game. The millions of falling flakes were mesmerizing. In the marshes, we did a brief muckl-up on an ice sheet. Soon after, we reached the only portage of the day, around Oakland Dam. Fortunately the ice cooperated, and did not break under us as we dragged the canoes to the trail. I decided to pole the canoe down the snowy slope on the other side of the dam, and managed not to fall. I'll have to try this on a bigger hill!

And alas, the day was not swim-free. Tommy, mere feet from the site of the spot that made him famous last year on Pnet when a photo of him poling in front of the dam was chosen as Photo of the Week on paddling.net, decided to slide down the bank into the river while kneeling in the canoe. Erik set up for the picture. He hit the water, yawed, braced...braced...BRACED...He's IN! Happy New Year! Gotta love dry suits!

Now we were in the home stretch, and the storm was working itself to a respectable blizzard. We were poling snowmen, with about half an inch of snow outlining the gunnels of the canoes and accumulating quickly on the floors. After having some fun at the dam, poling up and down various channels, we turned downstream, hearing a kingfisher chatter somewhere ahead of us. This stretch of the river is straight with steep banks, no houses, just a nice valley with plenty of large rocks to practice eddy turns behind. I was having trouble seeing through my snow-

speckled spectacles. Every half a second my face was bombarded with giant snowflakes. Didn't need the water bottle; just kept my mouth open!

Around the corner, and there was the concrete bridges before Glendale Rapids, our take-out. Eric and I beached above them, and watched as Tommy ran the drop and tried to pole back up them. And then Erik and I helped him carry the boat back up the bank to the top of the rapids so he could get out too.

The rain started immediately after I started driving home (great timing!) But man, we should have stayed on the river...it was safer! There was a little more than an inch of wet snow on the roads, and all the idiots were out. On the way home I nearly got kissed by a late-model Lincoln Town Car that decided to meander its way playfully into my lane despite the best frenzied efforts of its driver. I also passed two SUV's that played tree tag, and a Prius (same color as my wife's...yikes! Oh good, it's not her) that nearly rolled into a ditch, its rear right wheel hanging forlornly a foot off the ground, looking for traction. It was good to get home.

What a great way to start the new year. With apologies to Mike...we'll get out there soon, Dude!
